Sign up for Instant Decision Days, first round of application deadlines are typically Nov. 1st, 15th.

November

Colleges will typically let you know by April 1st if you are accepted!

April, 2022

October

Finish up any last standardized testing in Oct./November, send test scores, continue to submit applications. FAFSA opens Oct. 1st to apply for aid. December

Another big round of deadlines tend to be December 1st, 15th.

May 2022

You typically have to commit to a college by May 1st by sending in your deposit. After you commit, you will take placement tests, get an academic advisor, and attend orientation!

What is part of a college application?

In most cases, colleges are going to look at:

- Transcript (seen in the Parent Portal)
- Senior year class rigor
- GPA
- Test Scores (if not test-optional)
- Extracurricular Activities/Leadership Positions
- Community Service
- Essay
- Teacher and Counselor Recommendations


Test Optional Colleges

Some majors, programs, and scholarships may still require test scores even if the majority of the college is test optional. You should check with your colleges you are interested in before making a decision about taking standardized tests.

Recommendation Letters

 Most colleges, but not all, will require letters of recommendation from a teacher and/or a counselor. Some noteworthy exceptions: Rutgers and Middlesex County College do not require any recommendation letters.

Teacher letters

You should think about asking 2-3 teachers who you have a good relationship with if they are willing to write you a letter of recommendation. You should ask them before the end of Junior year if they are willing to write you a letter. If they agree, ask them if they need anything from you (some teachers have their own forms they want completed). The earlier you ask, the better; do not wait until last minute Senior year to do this, as you may get told no. Teachers write these letters on their own time and appreciate lots of notice.

Counselor Letter

- Rave Sheet, Activity Sheet, Parent Brag Sheet
- Think of this as one of the most important assignments of your high school career! The more information you give us, the stronger the letter we can write on your behalf!





College Visits- Food for Thought

In addition to admission requirements, academic programs, and financial aid, here are some suggestions for questions while you are on college visits: (Most of this can still be evaluated by a virtual campus tour! Otherwise, schedule a virtual meeting with an Admissions Counselor.)

- What are some unique/popular majors at your school?
- What would my freshman year course load look like?
- What is your average class size for frosh/soph level classes?
- Study abroad
- Describe dorm life
- What percentage of students live on campus?
- Do students stay on campus all four years?
- Can freshman have a car on campus?
- Describe your available student organizations (i.e. greek life, student government, clubs, athletics, etc)
- What is the surrounding community like?

How do students apply?

- Check on a college's website how they accept applications
- Common Application (<u>www.commonapp.org</u>)
 - Most common way to apply, most colleges accept it (two notable exceptions- Rutgers and Middlesex)
 - Essay topics typically announced for following school year at the end of January
 - Can start working on the application now, information will save until next year
 - Fill out one application and can submit it to any college that takes it!
- Institutional Application
 - Specific to a college, will be on a college's website
 - Ex: Rutgers, MCC
- Coalition Application
 - https://www.coalitionforcollegeaccess.org/

Financial Aid & Scholarships

- FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid)
 - Opens on October 1st, 2021
 - You will need a FSA ID, you can register here: https://fsaid.ed.gov/npas/index.htm
 - FAFSA: http://www.fafsa.ed.gov/
 - EHS will host a Financial Aid Information Session (Sept 30, 2021) and a Financial Aid Workshop (October 14, 2021). HESAA and local colleges (MCC) also often host free workshops.

Scholarships

- Merit, Need-Based (grants), Scholarships
- EHS website, EHS Senior Scholarship Application (January 2022), Collegeboard, Fastweb,
 etc.
- Senior Scholarship Workshops held
- Check with parents' employers, unions, the college's websites as well

Takeaways

- Start your research now!
- Be proactive and plan ahead.
- Deadlines matter!
- Complete your Rave Sheet early and any information your teachers ask for in order to write your letter of recommendation. You may only be asking 2-3 teachers, but they are receiving lots of requests!
- Start your essay and applications as soon as they are available. The early bird gets the worm!
- Read all emails/communication from counselors and colleges.
- Athletes- talk to your coach and register on NCAA Clearinghouse's website!
- Attend workshops, take advantage of information sessions.
- Use your resources.
- Planning starts now, not Senior year.


